INTRODUCTION

Holiday at Home

Holiday at Home is an opportunity for older people to experience the fun and fellowship of a change of scenery without having to pack a bag or stay away overnight in a strange place.

Holiday at Home was started by the Outlook Trust in 1996. This booklet produced by the Salvation Army's Older People's Ministries team aims to give helpful steps on how to run a successful "Holiday at Home". The idea of this resource is to offer you practical ideas and tips to enable you to be able to create a meaningful event for older people.

Holiday at Home events open a door to combat isolation and loneliness by introducing older people to new friends and experiences in their local area. Friendships can be cultivated and the church has an opportunity to connect with people in their community, creating space to have fun and make friends

GETTING STARTED

Things to Think About

This section poses practical questions to think about when considering running a Holiday at Home event. It's important to think of whom your event is for, your missional aims throughout the event and how this event fits into TIDE and your Mission Development Plan.

Finance and publicity

- What venue works best?
- Could we publicise the event at places like the library, doctors, local shops, post office?
- How big do you want the event to be? Decide on a maximum comfortable number of guests you can accommodate. Consider posters, flyers, advert in local paper, word of mouth is often best.

Facilities

- What space/facilities are available?
- How many rooms are available to us for use?
- What is access like to the building and is it disabled friendly?
- How are people going to get to your event?

Transport

Can you offer safe transport?

Prayer

- Who is praying for your event?
- Can the names of guests be put into a prayer notice for the wider congregation?
- Are there people who can commit to pray on the day either in the building or at home/work?
- Could the event be prayed for in Sunday worship/prayer meetings?

Team

- Who is coordinating and planning your event?
- Do you have a small team of people to help you or could you recruit more volunteers?

Outreach

Where will your guests come from?

Holiday at Home is an outreach tool, so why not encourage your regular church members to invite a friend or relative? You could make contact with some of the following to forge links.

- Existing church groups that meet midweek in your building.
- Local sheltered housing or assisted living accommodation.
- Community based groups for older people.
- Age UK local branch.
- Local library service or mobile library.
- You could also speak to local leaders and contact those people who have not attended for some time.

Access

It is important to try and make your holiday at home as accessible as possible for as many people as possible. Consider people living with dementia, visual impairments or hearing loss. Consider that some people may require a carer with them to support with personal tasks.

A few practical questions you could ask when planning your event.

- What is access like to the building?
- Is the building disabled friendly internally?
- Is signage clear and easy to understand?
- Are there stairs required to access certain areas?
- Are hallways clear of rubbish to allow safe passage for those moving around the building?
- Are there sufficient tables and chairs available?
- Can you get wheelchairs under the tables?

Sample Day

This is a sample of a day which can be enhanced by adding a theme.

9:15 - 10:00	Team brief and prayer Drivers leave to commence pick up at 9:30am
10:00 - 10:30	Guests arrive and are registered
10:30 - 11:00	Welcome and refreshments
12:15 - 1:15	Activity 1 - One session or more than if available
12:15 - 1:15	Lunch for all

1:45 - 2:45	Activity 2 - One session or more than if available
2:45 - 3:15	Afternoon tea with cakes
3:15 - 3:30	Thought for the day

4:00 - 4:15	Team debrief and feedback meeting
4:15 - 4:30	Set up ready for the following session if required

It is important to allow time between activities remembering that it can take older people who may have limited mobility longer to complete tasks. It will also take some older people a time to adjust to their new settings.

They had a theme song written about Stapleford-by-the-Sea (to the tune" I do like to be beside the side") which was sang at the start of each session. The Corps officer sat in a deck chair wearing shorts, t-shirt and a hanky on his head. He started each day with a bible story about the beach or seaside. This was told from the perspective of him being an onlooker at the scene. This was greatly received by all present.

They had a total of 6 volunteers plus 2 in the kitchen with around 30 people attending. If your event is well planned and coordinated on the days you can run with a small team. Obviously the more people available the further you spread the workload. One thing Stapleford did was too involve their local Girl Guide group. They came in on Wednesday and led a session on modern technology, looking at mobile phones, laptops and tablets. They supported with big games and cake decorating before helping with the service at meal time. The girl guides interacted well with the guests and the guides used it toward their hospitality badge.

Each day the corps provided a goody bag for every guest to take home. These included a cupcake (donated by the corps folk), stick of rock, bookmark, words of life tract, war cry and many more things.

Outings

Some holiday at home groups run an outing as part of their programme. The trip can be either the whole day or a half day event.

Trip Ideas

Garden centre Local village / town
Shopping trip (Outlet) Canal boat trip

Park / Nature reserve Seaside trip (Location dependent)

Art Galleries Cinema
Bowling Museum
National trust property Theatre trip

The day can take the same format as all other "Holiday at Homes" including

Welcome Registration Refreshments Activities Lunch

Theme Ideas

Themes often help with ideas and give you something to hang your ideas on. Here are some themes you could try out

Cruise Ship

Rename the rooms for example
Atlantic, Pacific & Mediterranean Lounge, Seven Seas Restaurant
Arrival = Boarding
Ending = Disembark
Games time = Deck games

You could show a film about cruising as an activity or a view of the sea film on repeat on a TV

Maybe get someone to speak about their experience on a cruise and show their photos as an activity

You could finish off with lunch on the last day as lunch at the captain's table and even have someone dressed as captain.

Under the Sea

Name the rooms for example Starfish lounge or Barrier Reef café

You could have a BBC underwater documentary playing silently or with music on a TV in the quiet area. You may be able to get someone from a local aquarium to come and talk about marine life.

Around the World

Each day could take a different country theme. You could have music playing in certain styles in the lounges and could theme the menu accordingly. You could maybe try and get activities based around certain countries i.e. you could make Chinese lanterns or decorate Chinese dragons. You could contact a local dance school and see if they do bhangra dancing and ask for a demo.

The Good Old Days

This could be set in the 40's or 50's. You could decorate the room with union jack bunting or for the 50's maybe old records. Volunteers could maybe dress up on one day to give a special feel. You could have an American Diner experience in the 50's. Be cautious about focusing on the war as for many older people this was a difficult time when they lost family members and may cause distress.

Seasons

You could have a different season each day. For spring you could plant bulbs and have a talk about gardening. For summer you could have a day at the beach with sand pits, ice cream van, Punch and Judy show. If you did winter you could have a Christmas celebration on the last day and maybe have Christmas dinner if possible. Each guest could receive a present. If you have enough team you could turn the room around while the guests are at their last activity before lunch and you could put up a tree and lay the tables with crackers.

Points to consider

Throwing in something special at the last meal and keeping it a secret gives that extra little boost to the end of the event.

Thought for the day...

It is important to ensure that this is optional as you would not want to make people feel uncomfortable. The thought for the day could be done at the beginning or end of the day and would even work around lunchtime if required.

Thinking who will deliver this message is very important as it needs to be geared to the audience. The message should be no more than 5 minutes long and should provide opportunity for people to reflect and consider the message delivered.

Some ideas for thoughts could be:

- Dramatic bible reading if you have someone capable of delivering in this way
- Story acted out with costumes and props
- Bible story with questions
- Godly play story
- Listening to a piece of music and spending time reflecting on its theme
- Taking an object and spiritualising it
- A short Christian film / clip with a poignant message

Example 1

God so loved the world JOHN 3:16

Items required: A globe

Discussion

Show the globe and discuss.

- Where is the furthest in the world you have travelled?
- If you could go anywhere in the world where would you go?
- What is the most unusual country name you can remember?

Thoughts

Talk about the fact that God loves the whole world so much he sent Jesus once and for all. Jesus came to be a sacrifice so we could be forgiven for our sins. Maybe sing, He's got the whole world in his hands or Amazing grace.

Example 2

She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins.

MATTHEW 1:21

Items required: A book of baby names

Discussion

Use the book and discuss the following looking up names in the book

- Does anyone know the meaning of their name?
- How important is your name to you?
- Does anyone use a different name to their given name?

Thoughts

John, Joan or Joanna means "God's gracious gift." Daniel or Danielle means "God is my judge." Michael or Michaela means "one who is like God."

When Mary and Joseph found out that they were going to have a baby, they didn't have to go to the library and get a book to choose his name. In fact, they didn't choose his name at all. God sent an angel to tell them, "You will have a son, and you will call his name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sin." You see, the name Jesus means "the Lord saves." God loved us so much that he sent his only Son to die on the cross to save us from our sin. The Bible tells us that there is no other name that can save us.

What is Holiday at Home?

Holiday at Home is a 3 day event, in a relaxed environment where you can enjoy fun, friend and food.

Who can attend?

Anyone aged 65 or over, whether you are active or less so. Although the event is being run by The Salvation Army you do not have to a member to attend.

What will happen during the days?

Each day there will be two main session. For each session you will have a choice of activities to take part in. Every day will be different but each day's programme will look something like this.

10:00-10:30 Arrive & Register

10:30—11:00 Morning Coffee with biscuits

11:00-12:00 Session 1-Choice of speaker or activity

1:45-2:45

12:15-1:15 Lunch—Followed by drinks and relax time Session 2—Choice of speaker or activity

2:45-3:15

Afternoon Tea with cakes 3:15-3:30 Thought for the day

3:30-3:45 End of day

In between session there will be plenty of time to chat or simply relax in a quiet corner. Newspapers, magazines, books and games will be available throughout. What more do you need when on holiday.

How much will it cost?

Holiday at home will cost £15 for all 3 days. We hope you can come to the whole event but if you are only able to attend on 1 or 2 days each day will cost £6 (If the cost will be a reason not to attend then please contact Joe Smith-see back for details.) | Lunch and refreshments plus all activities are included in this cost.

All activities will be in the main church building in Kingstown Street, Kingstown, K1 1BB. Disabled facilities are available.

How will I get there?

Please indicate on the booking form if you require assistance with transport. There is ample parking and we can be accessed on the number 17 bus towards Kingstown.

How do I book my place?


